TB FUNDING PLUS DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN TB AUTHORIZATION BILLS

NCET partners, particularly the American Thoracic Society, RESULTS, the American Lung Association, and the National TB Controllers Association continue to be very active this year in supporting domestic and global TB-related authorization bills and in educating legislators about the need for increased TB appropriations globally and domestically for TB prevention and control and for the development of new tools. **We have been asked to pass on the following latest alerts by NCET partners:**

Support the Global TB Legislation:

The global TB control bill, the Stop TB Now Act, H.R. 1567, is advancing in the House of Representatives after its unanimous passage in the Foreign Affairs Committee on July 31. ATS members and friends are urged to contact their Representative to request their cosponsorship and support for a House floor vote on the Stop TB Now Act, H.R. 1567, to ensure that the bill is passed by the House before Congress recesses in October. You may also contact your Representative today to urge them to cosponsor the Stop TB Now Act, H.R.1567, by calling the Capitol Switchboard at 1-202-224-3121 and ask for your Representative or give your state or zip code if you do not know their name. When you are connected to an office, ask for the Health Legislative Assistant. If you leave a voicemail message, include your name and phone number so that they can call you back. The following is a sample phone message: "I am a constituent and a healthcare provider from (your town) and I am calling to ask Rep. ___ to cosponsor the Stop TB Now Act, H.R.1567, to strengthen global TB control efforts and prevent outbreaks of drug resistant TB."

The Stop TB Now Act of 2007, S. 986/H.R. 1567, strengthens US leadership on international TB control and responds to the extensively drug-resistant (XDR) TB emergency by implementing the recommendations of the WHO plan for controlling tuberculosis globally. The legislation provides authority and resources for the U.S. Agency for International Development and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to develop urgently needed new diagnostic and treatment tools and provide technical assistance on international TB control. I ask that you cosponsor the Stop TB Now Act, H.R. 1567, to help eliminate this age-old disease.

Support the Domestic TB Legislation

For maximum effectiveness, please contact your Senators by September 6th. The domestic TB control bill, the Comprehensive TB Elimination Act, S. 1551, sponsored by Sens. Brown (D-OH), Hutchison (R-

TX) and Kennedy (D-MA), is advancing in the Senate. The bill is due to be considered by the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee in September. All ATS members and friends are urged to contact their two Senators to request their cosponsorship of the bill to ensure that it passes through the Senate HELP Committee and proceeds to a Senate floor vote. How to Take Action

Contact your Senators today to urge them to cosponsor the Comprehensive TB Elimination Act, S. 1551 and urge the HELP Committee to consider the bill as soon as possible. Call the Capitol Switchboard at 1-202-224-3121 and ask for your Senator or give your state if you do not know their name. When you are connected to an office, ask for the Health Legislative Assistant. If you leave a voicemail message, include your name and phone number so that they can call you back.

The following is a sample phone message: "I am a constituent and a healthcare provider from (your town) and I am calling to ask Sen. ___ to cosponsor the Comprehensive TB Elimination Act, S. 1551, and urge that the Senate HELP Committee vote on the bill as soon as possible. The bill must be passed this year to strengthen domestic TB control efforts to prevent outbreaks of drug resistant TB and expand research to find easier, more effective TB diagnostics, drugs and vaccines."

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Summary of the Comprehensive TB Elimination Act, S. 1551/H.R. 153: The bill, sponsored by Reps. Green (D-TX), Wilson (R-NM) & Baldwin (D-WI) and Sens. Brown (D-OH), Hutchison (R-TX) and Kennedy (D-MA) will increase funds for the CDC's National Program for the Elimination of Tuberculosis and state TB control programs, and expand research on TB diagnostic and treatment tools at the NIH and CDC. The bill will also: (1) authorize and expand CDC demonstration activities on TB elimination, including targeted efforts to prevent, detect and treat the disease among African Americans and foreign-born persons in the U.S.; (2) expand research, including study of the relationship between TB and HIV/AIDS, and research training programs at the NIH; and (3) authorize the "Blueprint Plan for TB Vaccine Development" at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID).

FROM RESULTS:

TB Scourge Will Meet Its Match with Action on TB Bills: Urge Senators to Lead on Halting TB Globally and Domestically by Cosponsoring Pending Legislation. Progress has been made in the House on passing legislation that will demonstrate U.S. commitment toward addressing the TB scourge that kills 1.6 million people each year. The House Foreign Affairs Committee passed H.R.1567, the Stop TB Now Act of 2007, and it will go to the floor of the House some time this fall. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee must now consider their version of the Stop TB Now Act of 2007 (S.968), and both chambers must consider the companion domestic bills (H.R.1532 and S.1551). The Stop TB Now Act is more likely to pass in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee if more senators cosponsor the legislation. That is where we all come in. We need to log in some calls to our Senate offices to let them know there is broad support for this legislation. So we all need to call our senators' offices and ask them to cosponsor S.968, the Stop TB Now Act of 2007, and S.1551, the Comprehensive TB Elimination Act; or, for those who want to have more impact, call your senators' offices and ask to speak to the aide in charge of foreign affairs and make the request for S.968, and ask for the aide in charge of domestic health and ask make the request to cosponsor S.1551. REMINDER: 12th IUATLD NORTH AMERICAN CONFERENCE

The 12th Annual Conference of the North American Region of the International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease (IUATLD) will be held **February 28-March 1, 2008** at the Bahia Resort Hotel in San Diego, California, USA. **STOP TB USA** (formerly known as NCET) **will host a special STOP TB meeting as part of this conference.** The meeting Abstract Committee is calling for submission of abstracts for poster or oral presentations of research on all aspects of tuberculosis control (including epidemiologic, clinical, basic science, nursing, social, behavioral, psychosocial and educational studies) to be presented at this conference. **Abstracts must be submitted on or before November 15, 2007.** Abstracts received after this date will not be accepted. NEW: NTCC TB TEACHING MATERIALS READY FOR FALL COURSES

Are you struggling with the need for new content about TB to deliver to young students in an active-learning format? **Are your students undergraduates in nursing, respiratory therapy, clinical lab sciences, physician assisting, or enrolled in medical school, pharmacy school, advanced practice nursing courses, or public health?** The National Tuberculosis Curriculum Consortium (NTCC) may have just what you need! Check out the website at <http://ntcc.ucsd.edu> and take the virtual tour. Then download the products that will be most useful. **NTCC has a variety of teaching materials available for free** and just asks that users register so they can keep track of website activity per NIH requirements. Users can then access interactive computerized case studies, multimedia images, questions/answers/teaching points, and clinical case descriptions. Standardized patient cases are also in development. The NTCC was established by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), National Heart Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI) in October of 2003 to improve knowledge of TB among health professions students. Headquarters are at the University of California San Diego with Antonino Catanzaro, MD, as Project Director. The NTCC includes about 40 faculty in 25 universities in the United States. The CDC Advisory Council for the Elimination of Tuberculosis (ACET) was instrumental in calling NIH's attention to this need back in 2002.

CALL FOR ABSTRACTS - ATS 2008 INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

The American Thoracic Society's "ATS 2008" International Conference will be held May 16-21, 2008 in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. We encourage attendance at this conference as well as submission of abstracts to ATS 2008. Abstracts on all aspects of respiratory disease are welcome. We encourage you or your agency to consider submitting an abstract for this conference where one can expect 200 or more TB-related presentations and posters which make it one of the world's major tuberculosis conferences. All submissions must be done online through the ATS website. The Deadline for electronic (online) submission is **WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31, 2007** (11:59 PM Central Time). Online submission is a quick and easy service which allows you to write, edit and submit your abstract at any time with access 24 hours a day, seven days a week. You may edit your abstract as many times as you wish prior to submitting it; when you have the abstract in its final version, you may submit it by clicking the SUBMIT ABSTRACT button. All abstracts will be reviewed; the accepted abstracts will be programmed by the International Conference Committee. A non-refundable abstract processing fee of \$70.00 must accompany each abstract submission. Please see specific instructions when submitting. (Editors note: TB collaborators in the Midwest often complain that TB meetings are too often held on the east and west coast - making travel more difficult and costly. Toronto is an easy flight or drive from many Midwest locations. NOW AVAILABLE: TB INFECTION CONTROL: A PRACTICAL MANUAL FOR PREVENTING TB

The Francis J. Curry National Tuberculosis Center is pleased to announce the introduction of a new product: "*Tuberculosis Infection Control: A Practical Manual for Preventing TB*" which is now available online, as a CD-ROM, and as a printed book. The Tuberculosis Infection Control Manual is designed to

provide information about TB infection control for clinics, homeless shelters, hospitals, and other interested parties. The goal of the manual is to provide consistent and up-to-date information about the guidelines and regulations pertaining to TB infection control, methods of reducing the risk of TB infection, and facility-specific guidelines for reducing the risk and dealing with potential TB exposure. Before the publication of this manual, information about the potential risk of TB infection in various facilities, ways to reduce the risk of infection, and engineering details were provided in multiple CNTC products. The following five products have been combined, and updated to reflect the CDC's '2005 Guidelines for Preventing the Transmission of Mycobacterium tuberculosis in Health-Care Settings,' to form this manual: (1) Tuberculosis Exposure Control Plan: Template for the Clinic Setting; (2) Conducting Sputum Induction Safely; (3) Isolation Rooms: Design, Assessment and Upgrade; (4) A Guideline for Establishing Effective Practices: Identifying Persons with Infectious TB in the Emergency Department; and (5) TB in Homeless Shelters: Reducing the Risk through Ventilation, Filters, and UV.
